It was emotionally hard and financially hard and spiritually hard. In hindsight, what a great plan God had to make sure that I knew with certainty that this was God's plan. I don't recall a time I doubted that I was where I was supposed to be.

I'd never had a migraine headache before that first year in Wycliffe (I forgot about "physically hard" in my list of kinds of hard). So my first migraine ever, I had this suggestion: "God, how about taking me away from this and putting me back on the sidelines? I could be like a cheerleader or auxiliary something right? Because I don't feel cut out to be the right-in-the-thick-of-it warrior person."

It's messy and bloody and hard here in the battlefield. I'm seeing people experience really hard things and hurtful things and people's marriages suffer and there are people experiencing mental breakdowns and things. It feels like it would be safer and far less painful on the sidelines. Note: in actual fact, I wasn't on the sidelines pre-Wycliffe. I didn't join the war when I joined Wycliffe. All of us are called to engage in a battle. And while the outcome is secure, in the midst of it, it doesn't feel anything like secure. It just seems messy and bloody and hard. I wonder occasionally, "God, wouldn't it make more sense to
