



Tips For Homework and Study Habits

Turn off the TV set. Make a house rule, depending on the location of the set, that when it is study time, it is "no TV" time. A television set that is on will draw youngsters like bees to honey.

Designate specific areas for homework and studying. Possibilities include the child's room or the kitchen or dining room table. Eliminate as much distraction as possible.

Consider you child's developmental level when setting the amount of time for home-

work. While high school students can focus for over an hour, first-graders are unlikely to last more than 15 minutes on a single task. Allow your child to take breaks, perhaps as a reward for finishing a section of the work.

Should parents help with

homework? Yes-if it is clearly productive to do so, such as calling out spelling words or checking a math problem that won't prove. Noif it is something the child can clearly handle himself and learn from the process. And help and support should always be calmly and cheerfully given. Grudging help is worse than no help at all!

Teach your child that studying is more than just doing homework assignments. One of the most misunderstood aspects of schoolwork is the difference between studying and doing homework assignments. Encourage your child to do things like:

 take notes as he's reading a chapter

- learn to skim material
- learn to study tables and charts
- learn to summarize what he has read in his own words
- learn to make his own flashcards for quick review of dates, formulas, spelling words, et cetera

Note-taking is a critical skill and should be developed. Many students don't know how to take notes in those classes that require them. Some feel they have to write down every word the teacher says. Others have wisely realized the value of an outline form of note-taking. Well prepared teachers present their material in a format that lends itself to outline form note taking..

Here are other ideas:

- Visit your child's classroom; a visit will give you an idea of what your child does at school and how he or she interacts with other children.
- Volunteer to help in the classroom as an assistant (listening to children read, for example, or serving as

an aide during computer work).

- Support student events and performances by helping with them (such as sewing costumes or painting scenery for a school play) and by attending them.
- Take advantage of parentteacher contracts (perhaps agreeing to read with your

child for a certain amount of time each night).

FYI on the PYP!!!

WHAT IS THE PRIMARY YEARS PROGRAMME (PYP)?

The PYP is a globally focused, inquiry-based, transdisciplinary curriculum for children aged 3–12. It is a whole school approach, now in 260 schools, with a system of accreditation to maintain its integrity. It was created in 1997 by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) based in Geneva Switzerland and is based on world best practice,

One of its major focuses is making connections across disciplines, focusing on inquiry-based learning and ongoing assessment. It has distinguishing features that set it apart, such as its global focus, the PYP Learner's Profile, the organizing themes and concepts and its strong emphasis on developing a professional learning community.

The PYP requires teachers to plan collaboratively using a prescribed Planner. Through this they develop:

- a central idea,
- a definition of the scope of the inquiry,
- resources and key questions.

Instructional activities are then designed simultaneously with assessment activities.

The skills valued and promoted by the IBO in the PYP are transdisciplinary skills:

- social,
- research,
- thinking,
- communication and
- self-management skills.

Importantly, these skills are assessed. The PYP encourages children to develop the attitudes of:

- appreciation,
- commitment,
- confidence,
- cooperation,
- creativity,
- curiosity,
- empathy,
- enthusiasm,
- independence,
- integrity,
- respect and
- tolerance (IBO, 2000, p. 35).

Activities are planned promote these attitudes, which must be considered in assessment.

Six Basic Behavior Tips

Discipline is a very tricky subject as you will agree as what works for one might not work for another. However, here are six basic points.

Behavior Tips

1.Speak to your child daily about the importance of showing respect and practicing cooperation. It helps them to learn and live well among others in the society. 2. Encourage your child to obey all rules. Rules help to protect everyone and ensure fairplay.

3.Consequences for indiscipline must be known before hand. The parent should know what behaviors to expect from the child therefore parent and child should plan ahead.

4.Consistency is the key to improving your child's behavior. Don't allow the child to "get away" sometimes.... that sends the wrong message.

5. Reward good behavior appropriately. Verbal praise can work as well as positive gestures eg a smile, handshake or a hug. Quality time is also significant.

6.Be a role model for your child. He/She will copy whatever you do or say.
