Then the computer guy there had to leave. It was kind of a mess. They only have a dial up internet connection; the connection speed is slow on a good day; plus it's on the other side of the world, but they really needed help so I tried remotely controlling the server. It was painfully slow --- as in it took me an hour and a half and all I did was open five files and make one change to each file. Ninety l-o-n-g minutes to do this sequence five times: open a file, make a change, save and close. It would take what? Three minutes to do if I was on-site. However, I was pleased/a little shocked remote control worked at all. It was great. I haven't yet solved the problem but it's a lot closer to solved than it was. Plus the non-computer administrator types there were thrilled and relieved that we could remotely control the server there from here. They had figured they were out of luck if they didn't have an on-site computer person.
